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This is our 20th edition of Good News Sunday Fairfield. We want to continue bringing you good news and heartwarming stories in these difficult times.

In the 14th edition there was a story about a group of people who cleaned up 9,000 pound of trash in three days. Well, an organization named Tennessee River Beautiful picked up around 15,700 pounds in two clean up events. 17 volunteers took out 6,286 pounds of trash filling 154 bags of trash in the Knoxville and Louisville area. 41 volunteers took 9,426 pounds from the Watts Bar Lake filling 248 trash bags. "We are blown away by the ever-increasing enthusiasm and momentum around river cleanup efforts in diverse communities in the Tennessee River watershed," said Kathleen Gibi, Executive Director for Keep the Tennessee River Beautiful." Research

Emojis

Emojis are everywhere in digital life. People use them in text, email, social media and more. They express emotions in text where there is not a lot of it.

At first there were emoticon. Those are when you type regular characters and they look like something. Emojis were made by Shigetaka Kurita in 1999. He made them to communicate information easier in DOCOMO the Japan mobile carrier he worked for. To do this he sketched 176 12 by 12 pixel images. These could be selected from a keyboard in their interface. Soon other companies started copying this. Then in 2007 a Google team decided to try to get the emojis into the Unicode Consortium. The Unicode Consortium is a group that works with the UN that standarizes text across computers by making a universal code so it is easier for computers to talk to eacher. Soon two Apple employees submitted a proposal to adopt 625 new emojis. Unicode accepted the proposal in 2010. Because of these emojis are standardized they can be updated. The Unicode Consortium adds new emojis every year. It can take up to 2 years to get it approved. The proposal has to be very good with evidence on why it needs to be an emoji to pass it throught the emoji subcommittee of Unicode.
