Denise Sanchez and her family were going camping for Father's Day when there was a very strong storm. The next day tragedy struck when a tree fell on one of her sons eight-year-old Robert while she was in the bathroom. "The force, the thump, was so loud that I couldn't believe it. I was pretty far from there, and you could feel it, all the people from the campsites around were running toward us, and there was this humongous tree on the ground." Denise said. Neithan her 15-year-old son saw Robert trapped and ran to help him. Neithan pushed away all the branches and freed his little brother. Robert was then taken to the Riley Hospital for Children by the firefighters. Thanks to Neithan Robert only had a broken arm. Robert was very grateful for his brother. "Nothing could have prevented it," Denise added. "I'd say being prepared for a problem is best especially in an area with no cell service." Independence Day

Today is 4th of July or Independence Day. It was made a federal holiday in 1870 but was celebrated as early as 1781 in Massachusetts. Soon other territories and states took up the tradition by the mid-19th century. On July 2nd in 1776 the Continental Congress voted for independence and then 2 days later on July 4th the 13 colonies adopted a Declaration of Independence. That is how it became Independence Day or the 4th of July.

In April 1775 the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out. They first wanted just to be on good terms with Great Britain but then they wanted independence. Then in 1776 on June 7 the Continentinal Congress met in Pennsylvania's State House to talk about independence. They had a big debate and appointed Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of New York to write the declaration of independence. Jefferson made himself the leader of the group and wrote the first draft.

We hope you are having fun celebrating the 4th of July and our independence. There are many ways to celebrate 4th of July the most common is seeing big fireworks and see a 4th of July parade. Many people bake cookies in star shape. A lot of people have picnics and parties with friends and family.

One common item in the 4th of July festivities is the stared spangled banner. The songs lyrics were made by Francis Scott Key while he was watching the attack on Fort McHenry and called it Defense of Fort M'Henery. This song grew very popular and on March 3, 1931 the title was changed and adopted as the national anthem. The star-spangled banner is now played at most of public events and on fourth of July.

Uncle Sam is an iconic character of America and all that we stand for. The name was originally thought of because of a meat supplier. In the 19th century Samuel Wilson was a meat supplier that supplied a lot of meat to the army in crates with their name on it. The soldiers started calling it a gift from 'Uncle Sam' and the name stuck. Thomas Nast was a political cartoonist. He drew Uncle Sam as a person with a white beard and top hat along with patriotic clothing. Uncle Sam first appeared in his cartoons in 1838. Later James Montgomery Flag made Uncle Sam by making the now famous "We Want You" poster. Uncle Sam appears in parades and films and has become a symbol of patriotism.
