They want to provide excellent food, shelter, clothing, education, job training and counseling to those in need. They want to return the community to a whole. There are more than a thousand people in Bridgeport, Norwalk and Stamford who are homeless and 35% of children in Bridgeport live below the poverty line. Thanksgiving is a day to come together and be thankful and grateful. Here is some history on how Thanksgiving came together.

The Thanksgiving history started in 1616 when the Wampanoag tribe that lived in what now is Massachusetts and Rhode Island got infected by a disease from the European traders. 2/3 of the tribe died and only 1/3 survived. Their leader's name is Oosamequan. Oosamequan was worried that other tribes would see that the Wampanoag were weak and try to invade or attack the Wampanoag tribe.

When the Mayflower landed in the Wampanoag's area it was winter and it was very cold. Almost 100 people came off of the boat, they were all sick, tried and unprepared. Since they were low on food and unprepared, they stole food from the Wampanoag tribe. Each day more of the English were dying from hunger, cold and illness. They were like Wampanoag; they did not want others to see their weakness as an opportunity to attack. They took sick English from their homes and made them sit next to a tree while holding a gun. They also buried the dead English in the ground at night so no one would see or notice. ½ of the English were dead by the end of the winter.

In March, a Native American man named Samoset came into the English's camp. Samoset was from Maine and was a leader there but came to stay with the Wampanoag tribe. As he arrived to their camp he said "Welcome, Englishmen!" The Wampanoag sent Samoset to set up a time the Wampanoag tribe could meet the English. Oosamequan showed up to the English camp with a lot of other Wampanoag members. They both, the Wampanoag and the English did not know what the other was going to do or if the other was going to attack. So, the Wampanoag gave the English some of their people and the English gave the Wampanoag some of their people so neither couldn't do any tricks. John Carver was the governor of Plymouth. Plymouth is where the English camp was, but before the illness came it was called Patuxet. John Carver had a drink with Oosamequan. John Carver called Oosamequan "Massasoit." "Massasoit" means great leader.

They made an agreement that they would always come to each other in peace and always defend each other from attacks. Oosamequan sent a native American who could speak English to Plymouth. His name is Tisquantum but they called him Squanto. Tisquantum showed the English how to survive. In 1621 fall, Tisquantum's help paid off and they had a lot of food. The Wampanoag tribe heard gunshots that came from the English camp. So, the Oosamequan went to Plymouth to check-on the English with 90 Wampanoag members. When they got there, they saw the English firing guns. They were celebrating a good harvest. William Bradford was the new governor of Plymouth at that time. William Bradford was happy to have them over but there was not enough food for everyone so the Wampanoag hunted and caught a lot of deer. They ate and drank for three days.

This was not the end of the story, much later in 1863 Abraham Lincoln made Thanksgiving as a national holiday. Abraham Lincoln thought it would help bring together the U.S.A during the Civil War.
